You will even find that the GP Komix don't necessarily need a full-page Cover either, as long as the first page is full of interesting illustrations that will attract people to our lit.—And please don't forget that we still prefer at least 3 or 4 illustrations per page! of Letratons in it is often the easy way out & does not necessarily fill it up well. Please do some real "pick 'n shove!" work and put some interesting detail in! Sad to say, with a few TKs we've received, the belance per page was almost one-third text, one-third pictures and one-third blank space! (Now don't go to the one-third blank space! (Now don't go to the other extreme and have your pages cluttered, but as long as your work is neat, it shouldn't be. Look at the 1K "They Can't Stoo Our Rain" (no. 128) on pg. 381 of TK Vol. Two, and see how Abraham Snowman filled every space with interesting and beautiful background detail! You can too!—Amen?)
