



By living communally and working together as a united Family, you are able to be a help to those living with you in many ways.



• You are able to share the responsibility and care of the house, the property, and the vehicles.


◆ You are also able to share the expense of housing and vehicles. These are usually some of the biggest expenses, and through living communally and sharing your finances, you're able to afford good vehicles and rent nice housing.



• The adults are able to share the responsibility of caring for the children. This includes sharing the responsibility of homeschooling the children.




Homeschooling is much more difficult for a parent to handle in a singlefamily home. While one parent is working to earn money to support the family, the other parent is on her (or his) own to teach the kids all of their school subjects, and take care of the cooking and cleaning in the house as well.




In communal living, the adults are able to work together to homeschool the children. Because there are more adults in a communal Home, between them there are more talents that they have, which they are able to teach to the children.



• Witnessing is the Family's main goal, and by living and working together and sharing the household responsibilities Home members are then able to spend more time telling people about Jesus.



♦ By having all things in common, you are able to share your material goods. When a few families live together, each family doesn't need to have as many material belongings as a worldly family would need. This also means you don't need as much money to cover your needs.




For example, when two, three, or more families live together in one house, they can share the expense of the rent. But if it was only one family renting the house, that one family would need to pay the full rent.




By having more than one family live in a house, the utility bills are also shared. For example, the expenses of the phone, the electricity, the water, and the gas are shared. Of course, with more families living in the house, you use more of these utilities. But it still usually comes out cheaper than if you were to live separately, with each family having to pay for the utilities on their own.


◆ One example of this is when one of the adults cooks a meal, he or she uses the gas or electricity to cook that meal on the stove. By cooking for three families at one time, the amount of gas or electricity used for cooking for those three families all together is less than if three cooks individually cooked three separate meals on three separate stoves for their three separate families.



• Or when you are in the dining room and have the overhead lights on, it doesn't matter if there is one or fifteen people in the dining room, the same overhead lights are on, which means that either way, the same amount of electricity needs to be paid for.



◆ There is another big advantage to living communally. You are able to fellowship and talk about Jesus together every day! You don't just meet once or twice a week to talk about Jesus, read God's Word together, and pray together. You do some of these things together every day!







When you read the rest of the Book of Acts you will find that this "living in unity"—communal living—resulted in Jesus giving the disciples greater power and anointing in their witnessing!



As Family members you live communally to help you to be stronger disciples for Jesus; to make you better and more successful missionaries, and more capable of spreading Jesus' love all around the world.
